## State of Indiana Cooperative Invasives Management

- Formed in 2008, SICIM's goal has been to support the formation of local CISMAs (Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas) within original 35-county region
- In 2018, the Indiana Invasives Initiative was developed in partnership with the USDA-NRCS and other entities such as SWCDs, TNC, State Soil Board/Clean Water Indiana, and more, expanding our reach and covering the entire state

Sometimes called a CWMA

Cooperative Weed Management Area

• A CISMA is a partnership organization formed with the goal of managing invasive species across jurisdictional and landownership boundaries.



## Benefits of Creating and Following a Management Plan



Gives you an opportunity to decide what YOUR goals are for your property

Helps with Early Detection and Rapid Response (EDRR) Management becomes proactive instead of reactive over time





## Things to consider when designing your plan:

- This is most likely a multi-year plan that is revisited each year.
   Invasive management is a process and requires prioritization and adaptation.
- 2. Know species present
- 3. Who will be doing the work?
- 4. What does your schedule look like?
- 5. Plan ahead! My favorite time to create or revise a plan is in December/January/February. Give yourself time to prepare and be ready.





## **Step One: Survey**

• What invasive species do you have? How much of each one, and where?

Other species such as natives?

What borders the property? Invasives present?

 Type of current habitat/land use, and site location









## **Step 2: Your Property Goals and Objectives**

#### What are your goals for management?

- Restore to a more natural and functional habitat?
- Provide habitat for wildlife? Anything specific?
- Provide a natural area for your family to enjoy?
- Have flowering plants throughout the seasons?
- Create a rain garden with native plants to mitigate water issues?







## Step 3: Species Prioritization

Okay, so you have bush honeysuckle, privet, wintercreeper, and oriental bittersweet. What do you tackle first?

- General rule of thumb: the less you have, the higher the priority
- If you have several species to deal with, pick the top 2 or 3 to focus on the first year.






## **Step 4: Finalize Your Plan**

## Now that you have an idea of what you need to target first, plan it!

- When is the optimal time of year for removal?
- Do you have the right equipment, or do you need to stock up? Can you rent it? Are you trained in using it or is someone on your team trained?
- Create a management calendar (next slide)
- If it is a natural area (i.e. not a landscaped area), do you plan to supplement with native plants?

  Research needed: plants native to the habitat, where to purchase, seed or plugs, budget, etc. (see resources at end)







## **Management Calendar**

Pull garlic mustard Foliar spray oriental Cut and treat woody cut woody species as bittersweet weather permits invasives Monitor for woody invasives leafing out Foliar spray sweet Spray wintercreeper planning for next year autumn clematis Winter Spring Summer







Get to it! This is what you've been working toward.

#### Tips during the process:

- Keep a journal
- Photo documentation
- Give yourself grace
- Share your progress!








## After the first year...

- Pat yourself on the back
- Revisit the plan, your notes what worked, what didn't?
   Why?
- Adapt the plan accordingly
  - Goals changed?
  - Did you find new invasives?
  - Will you have the same amount of help next year?
  - What do you need to focus on next year? Same?


